Introduction

This module will focus on why horses behave the way they do and how to treat unwanted behaviours. Candidates will explore unwanted behaviours from a causal and functional perspective, considering the behaviour indicators of pain, stress, range of emotions and behavioural syndromes in horses. Candidates will be able to create behavioural modification plans to improve equine behaviour and welfare. Finally, there is a focus on human behaviour change and how it may be communicated to improve both human and equine welfare.

Aims

This module is aimed at vets who want to offer a service for seeing behavioural medicine cases. It is designed to help candidates develop both practical and theoretical skills in the field. The candidate is expected to build on the foundation skills developed when undertaking the A and B modules, and to demonstrate progression towards advanced practitioner skills. The candidate will be able to evaluate their own standards of practice and develop strategies for continuous improvement in the future.
