Summary of the Visitors' findings

- The Royal Veterinary College (RVC) submitted an application for accreditation of an additional Certificate in Advanced Veterinary Nursing (CertAVN) designation, at both graduate and postgraduate levels. The CertAVNs are validated by the University of London, and taught and awarded by the RVC.
- A virtual accreditation event was held online on 12 July 2022 to review the following programmes:

Graduate Certificate in Advanced Veterinary Nursing – Medical Nursing Postgraduate Certificate in Advanced Veterinary Nursing – Medical Nursing

• The Panel received a warm welcome from the staff and are grateful to all those who were responsible for preparing the event, arranging the schedule and providing supplementary information when requested. RVC was very accommodating with required agenda changes and ensured the relevant personnel were available at the required times.

The team found the following:

- RVC is to be **commended** for developing a unique focus of study for a CertAVN designation, utilising an innovative assessment methodology which could encourage publication opportunities for students, which in turn may reflect the advancement of the veterinary nursing profession.
- RVC is to be **commended** for its utilisation of subject matter experts and allowing students the opportunity to work alongside these experts in an on-campus clinical facility.
- RVC is to be **commended** for the exceptional feedback provided by students on the existing pathways, demonstrating outstanding student satisfaction.
- RVC is to be **commended** for the standard of its online learning platform, which is of particular value to this blended type of provision.
- Areas for further review included ensuring RCVS Registered professionals comply with all CPD requirements.

The findings in this report are based on the RCVS panel's review. The panel are not the decision makers and their commendations, suggestions and actions may be subject to amendment during the committee process.

Staff lists and CVs demonstrate the highly suitable educators involved in the development of the course. External Advisors are regularly utilised and contribute to periodic course reviews. External Examiner (EE) comments are not yet available as the course has not yet recruited and the existing programmes have not completed their first year.		
The online learning platform (Learn) shows excellent use of a variety of online tools, which are to be highly commended. The methods of engaging learners in the curricula, and the excellent signposting of the unit objectives ensure the curriculum incorporates the programme outcomes.

These modules are shared with the already accredited programmes and ensure consistency between each of them. Feedback from students for these two modules is excellent, for which the programme team are to be commended.

The option of spending time with different departments at the hospital is an excellent opportunity for students. This sets the RVC courses apart from others and should allow for a valuable learning experience for those completing the programme.

At least one EE is appointed for all programmes delivered at the RVC, with two EEs appointed for the veterinary nursing programmes. At present, one of the EEs is not an expert in the veterinary industry, however, their breadth of knowledge and experience in a related health field provides valuable feedback and programme development opportunities, which allows this requirement to be met. Nevertheless, this approach is not fully reflected within the RVC External Examiner policy, which states that the EE should 'normally' be competent in the field covered by the course. It is suggested that RVC updates the relevant policy to ensure there is clarity on the procedure to be followed.		
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Conclusion:

The evidence provided demonstrates that the proposed programme has been designed and developed by suitably qualified members of the profession and will be delivered and evaluated appropriately. The proposed curriculum is focused on topics that are relevant to veterinary nurses who wish to focus on medical nursing. The assessment approach is innovative and relevant to the profession and will give students opportunities for publication. The modules shared with other already accredited programmes will ensure consistency between programmes and will ensure students are provided with the suitable tools to be successful.

This Standard has been fully met with no actions to be addressed.

Suggestions:

- a. Consider amendments to the learning objectives, demonstrating the stretch and challenge above and beyond the Licence to Practise requirements, ensuring terminology is consistent across documentation.
- b. Review EE policy to demonstrate that one EE should be a subject matter expert.

The majority of this Standard was met prior to the accreditation event, based upon VNEC's previous review of compliance for CertAVN programmes at the RVC. It was very apparent that the personnel involved in the development, delivery and assessment of the CertAVN programmes are suitably qualified and experienced who can share their expertise with future students.
