

Strengthening veterinary nursing ties within Europe

The final conference for the Veterinary European Clinical Training and Assessment Record project, otherwise known as Vectar, is now looming, and will be held in Finland at Amiedu College, on 30 August 2013.

The event will see all of our partners present their findings from this exciting and innovative project.

The conference is free to attend, and open to anyone with an interest in VN training across Europe. It will offer those who've not yet been involved in Vectar the chance to access the Clinical Training and Assessment Record (CTAR), an electronic experience log created to record essential skills, experience and competence, and to guide both students and the qualified veterinarians and nurses who supervise them.

Throughout this project the partners (see back page) have met twice, first in Amsterdam during summer 2012, and later in Porto during spring 2013. These meetings have been very beneficial, with all partners actively contributing to the development of the CTAR tool, skills list and clinical coach training package, and veterinary nurse training overall.

The strengthening of ties between our European partners has helped develop an effective and robust veterinary nursing training programme.

Although the August conference will be our last official Leonardo da Vinci-funded meeting, we hope to maintain these very useful ties for future developments in VN training.

We would like to thank all partners for their involvement and enthusiasm for this project, and look forward to seeing many of you in Helsinki in August.

The story so far...

The CTAR has now been piloted by all of our partner veterinary nursing schools. In addition, and following the partner meetings in Amsterdam and Porto, evaluation reports have been undertaken by the Federation of European Companion Animal Veterinary Associations (FECAVA). We were very pleased to read in its last report that:

"Participants found the leadership and management of the project to be very professional and efficient. Some of the partners who have participated in similar education projects before commented that Vectar was the best managed project in which they have participated."

One of the major benefits found during the pilots was that participating schools could monitor student progress and achievement from their school and identify, early in the programme, those students who appear to be 'failing' and undertake appropriate support measures.

There is a new concept for students in the CTAR, which requires them to reflect on their veterinary nursing experiences – this can only help develop critical evaluation and development of clinical skills.

Following feedback, further adaptations have been made to the skills list and functionality of the CTAR, which are being piloted by five of the ten partners. In addition, an online interactive clinical coach training programme has been developed to support those within practice involved in veterinary nurse training. The emphasis on this support programme is on the teaching of clinical skills by breaking down each component; these tools will be available at the summative conference in Helsinki.

Feedback from our partners regarding the functionality and the skills listed has been extremely positive, however, an important consideration would appear to be financial sustainability, given the current economic pressure on educational budgets.

CTAR has many features which enable a school to support and develop clinical supervisors and quality-assure student progress and achievement.

The final conference will provide an opportunity to share these features and discuss the advantages and benefits of using CTAR to monitor students during their clinical placement period.

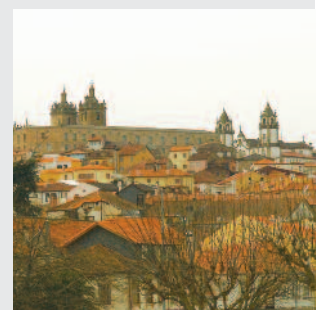


To be a part of the Vectar project

We are now concentrating on sustainability when the project funding ends this year. We are receiving interest in this type of system for supporting clinical learning for vets as well as nurses from European schools not currently involved with the project, and also from South Africa. So things are looking positive.

This collaboration has generated many benefits to our partners and could be extended beyond the

scope of Vectar, having the potential to inspire similar European collaborations amongst others who are in contact with the partners.

The partner schools are now well into the final phase of piloting both the revised CTAR and clinical coach training package and, following this academic year of trialling, further refinements may be made in our final meeting in autumn 2013.
